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## Staying Safe Online

Some advice from Elm Class

Someone sends you a picture that upsets you.

What should you do?

You should tell your parents, so that they can delete it for you. You could also pick out things to kind of turn the mood of the picture to something that cheers you up or makes you feel happier.

You find a really cool site but you need to pay £5 a month to access it. You know where your dad's bank card is.

What should you do?

Always ask your dad or whoever's bank card you've found. Also show them the site just to check it is safe. To know if a website is secure, you can look next to the search bar. If there is a padlock next to it, it means it is secure.

Someone has created a fake profile of you on a website, full of nasty comments and horrible pictures.

What should you do?

When you find the account, ask the person to delete the account. If they say no warn them you will contact the authorities. If they still say no tell an adult and they will deal with it.

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You want to join a website with lots of cool games on it, but you need to fill in a form giving them your name, phone number and home address.

What should you do?

I would either think up a random name, number and address so they don't come to me. I would also tell an adult to make sure they agree with me for what to do. Another thing I would do is not play the game at all.

You have made friends with a boy called Ryan online. He has asked you to send him a photo of yourself.

What should you do?

Block him, report him and tell an adult because that is very inappropriate and shouldn't be ignored.

You have joined a site that requires a profile picture. What should you do?

The best solution for this situation is to not definitely not put a picture of yourself or your family. Put something very anonymous like a cartoon character or just a colour. This problem involves **trial & error**. You need to be prepared to move the cards around in order to find a solution that works for each box. The Year 6 National Tests which our oldest children take before they move on to High School often feature a question in this style.

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
