An important reading skill we need to practise is putting what we have read into our own words.

This shows that we have understood what we read.



### Using our <u>own words</u>

First, we need to read our sentence carefully:

A small deer walked into the forest.



Next, we need to pick out the important words in the sentence. Which words give us the most information?

A small deer walked into the forest.



Discuss - which words give us the most information?



Can you design and make a clock. Does it have to be a circle? Can you use a different shape?


Look at the hands closely are they the same length?
The Hour hand is the short hand and the Minute hand is the longer one.




When the minute hand is pointing to the number 12.....It is o'clock.


The Hour hand is pointing at the 3 so the time is 3 o'clock.








The time is 3 o'clock.

At three o'clock the longer minute hand should be pointing at 12 and the shorter hour hand should be pointing at 3





Is Alex correct?
Explain your reasoning.

Alex is incorrect. If the time is eleven o'clock, the hour hand should be pointing at 11 and the minute hand should be pointing at 12
