Suggested afternoon activities for the week:

- Can you make some complex origami? Could you make an artistic sculpture out of individual origami pieces?
- Japanese writing is often done with a brush. Can you practise your
 Japanese writing and make yourself a sign for your room?
- There is a specific type of comic drawing in Japan called manga.
 Many of the characters from television and popular culture are
 drawn in this way- for example, Pokémon. Research this way of
 drawing and draw yourself as a manga character or design your own
 Pokémon!
- There is plenty of blossom around now, why not take a photograph of these on a daily walk and edit it artistically or try painting or drawing your own.
- Koi carp are very symbolic in Japanese culture as you found in previous weeks, you could practise your sketching by copying a koi carp drawing.
- Research some famous Japanese art and artists and create a presentation about them or try to copy a piece of art yourself.


This is often when the <u>last</u> letter of the <u>prefix</u> and the <u>first</u> letter of the <u>root word</u> are <u>vowels</u>.




Maths

L.O: To create arrays.

Today we are going to look at the different ways that multiplication facts can be written or shown. You may see some multiplication facts shown as arrays. Here are some examples below:









An array is an arrangement of objects in rows and columns to represent a multiplication fact. For example, 3 rows of 5 will equal 15 objects and can be written as $3 \times 5 = 15$ or $15 \div 3 = 5$ or $15 \div 5 = 3$, or 5 + 5 + 5 = 15 Your challenge today is to have a go at creating your own array using objects around the house or finding a real life array in your house and writing different multiplication and division facts from the array you have created. Can you write two multiplication facts? Two division facts? Your multiplication as a repeated addition?

Challenge: Can you write a BIDMAS question where your array is your answer or a word problem where you array is your answer? I would love to see some photos of the arrays you have created and the Maths from these!

English

L.O: To write a letter to Michelle Magorian.
