

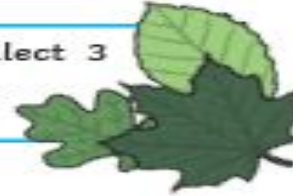
If a ladybird has 4 spots on one side and 4 spots on the other side, how many does she have in total?

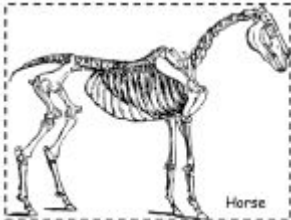
Can you compare humans to other animals?
