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

ARITHMETIC:

Can you work out the missing lengths in these pieces of string? You could get a piece of string of the same length and do this practically if it helps you.



This string is 18cm long. Length A is 7cm long. How long is length B?



The middle section of the string is the lengths of C and D put together. What is the total length of the string?

MATHS:

This week in maths we are looking at solving problems that may involve spotting patterns, missing numbers and making links. Today we will be looking at a problem involving triangles and matchsticks!



Discuss....


Do you sometimes see patterns around you? For example, you might see patterns in sequences of cars in traffic sometimes - maybe, just by chance, every fourth car was blue.

Or, perhaps your flower beds have patterns of different flowers and colours in them.


Think about any patterns you might have seen and talk about them with someone!

I was exploring a puzzle in which headless match sticks had to be moved to make a different number of triangles.

I made one small triangle



I made it into 4 small triangles by adding 6 matches.



Can you count how many matches are used in the picture with 4 triangles?

Now try to predict how many more matches would be needed to make another row of triangles underneath the second one?

See if you can carry on predicting how many matches you would need to add to make a triangle with 4 rows?

What about 5 rows? 6 rows? 7 rows? 8 rows?

Once you have guessed how many matches you will need, you could try to test it by either drawing the triangles in your exercise book or having a go at making them yourself using matchsticks or lolly sticks.

- Can you see a link between the number of rows and the total number of matches?
- Can you see a link between the number of small triangles and the total number of matches?

- 3.) Research Aztec Gods. Can you draw one and label the diagram with any special features they have?
- 4.) Find out about Ojos de Dios (God's eyes) and try making your own. What do they represent? What were they used for and by whom?
- 5.) Research some traditional Mexican foods and try to make them. You could make salsa and dips and eat them with tortillas and nachos. Or try something more exotic like mole or tres leches cake!

 Can you come up with your own price list using chocolate as money? What could 1 chocolate bar buy you? What could 10?
- 7.) Find out about ancient ball game called 'pltz' played by the Mayans and try playing it yourself.
