MATHS:
This week in maths we are looking at data handling. This includes collecting data and drawing tables and graphs, as well as answering questions about the information we collect.

Do you ever notice that sometimes there is a link between things?


## Discuss....

- Is there a link between the number of ice creams sold and the weather.
 When would you expect more ice creams to be sold?
When would you expect less to be sold?
- What about the age of a child and the time that they go to bed?
- Or the time of and the number of houses with their curtains closed?
- Can you think of any more linking things?

Sometimes graphs can show us these links very clearly. If we can see a clear upward or downward curve in a line we can spot a pattern. This can be called interpreting graphs, or reading them.

We interpret graphs in other ways, for example identifying in which month the most ice creams were sold.

## ENGLISH: TO LOOK AT THE EFFECTS OF ALLITERATION AND REPETITION.

Here is the next page of The Promise. Well done! You persuaded the girl to keep her promise to plant the acorns.

I forgot the food and money and for the first time in my life I felt lucky, rich beyond my wildest dreams.

I slept with the acorns for my pillow my head full of leafy visions.

I planted besides roads, on roundabouts. Among rubble, ruins and dusty railings. By train tracks, tram lines and traffic lights. In abandoned parks and gardens laced with broken glass. Behind factories and shopping malls, at bus stops, cafes, blocks of flats. I pushed aside the mean, the hard and the ugly. And I planted. Planted. Planted.


Nothing changed at first. The gritty wind still scratched the parched, cracked streets. The people scowled and scuttled to their homes like cockroaches. But slowly, slowly, slowly shoots of green began to show.

After reading up to slowly, slowly, slowly, shoots of green began to show, consider these questions:
1.) Can you pick out where words are repeated three times? Why might the author have chosen to repeat these words? What might the rhythm created represent?
2.) Write down any alliteration you found. Remember this is when words are used next to each other that begin with the same letter. What effect does this create?
3.) Now look at the pictures. Does the circular roundabout resemble a seed? How does this add to the story? Can you spot any other seed-like images on the pages we have read?
4.) Now try to write some alliterative sentences of your own for other potential planting locations. You could think of other places in the city or use your own local area like your garden! You could go outside and look for places you could plant some seeds - by trees, tarmac and treehouses, for example. Try to use alliteration if you can! If you wanted, you could even plant some seeds and write about the experience.
1.) Find out about the different festivals that are celebrated in Mexico. Can you make a calendar of celebrations?
2.) Can you research Carnavale and find out about some of the dances and music that are used to celebrate? Could you learn one?
3.) Find out about the town where Cinco de Mayo originates from. What is special about it?
4.) Can you find some recipes that are eaten at festivals and celebrations in Mexico? Could you try to make one?
5.) Research the Mexican National anthem. What festival is this sung at? Compare it to our national anthem. Are there any similarities? Which do you prefer?
6.) How do Mexicans celebrate the Day of the Dead? Can you create some artwork based on this celebration or create a sugar skull?
7.) Consider the religions of Mexico. What do they believe in and celebrate?
