Learn about Livestock Project



As well as getting to spend time with the sheep and help feed them, the children have undertaken lots of sheep-related learning this week. Here is a taster of what we've done:

- Elm Class: The Year 5s have been learning about area and perimeter and used this to measure and then design their own sheep enclosures. They also learnt how to weave wool.
- Maple Class have loved Sheep Week! We've learnt about where wool comes from and what the world would look like without any! We've watched videos of real sheep farmers and learnt about the work that shepherd and shepherdess' do too!
- Cedar class have had great fun with the sheep! In art we have been looking at how the pen has changed over time, we linked this with looking at Henry Moore, as he uses biro in his artwork. As a class we went outside and sat with the sheep to sketch them in Henry Moore's style. In maths we are learning about perimeter, so we measured the perimeter of the sheep pen!
- Oak Class have enjoyed sharing the sheep with their families at our Mundford Junction this week. First, we completed a wool printing craft in class, then gave the sheep their breakfast. Also, a big THANK YOU to Mrs West who kindly made 30 weaving frames and taught us how to weave and wool wind this week.
- Acorn Nursery really enjoyed feeding and stroking the sheep and lamb. They have been busy learning Baa Baa Black Sheep and have enjoyed making their own craft sheep. They will be sad to see them go!
- Hazel class learnt about how a sheep's coat changes from summer to winter. They had a Mundford Junction where they looked at the sheep with their parents, then came back to the classroom and labelled parts of the sheep.

- Sycamore class have been writing newspaper articles about the sheep being at Mundford and the learning experiences the children across the school have had. They have also sketched the sheep and painted portraits of them with acrylics as part of our art sessions.
- In Rowan, we have been learning some fun facts about sheep. We spoke about how their digestive system is different to a human and why their eyes have rectangular pupils! We also enjoyed some sheep inspired crafts including weaving and sketching.


Weekly Focus: Behaviour

I have had lots of discussions with parents about pupil behaviour at home, especially at the end of day at school. Here are some suggestions to help with the hometime transition.

Tips for Managing After-School Meltdowns

If you are finding yourself trying to cope with after-school meltdowns from your child, know you are not alone! This is really common for children of all ages. The reasons can be varied. Maybe your child has had enough of sitting down for most of the day and needs to let off steam, they had a disagreement with a friend at lunchtime and don't feel like it's been resolved or maybe they are simply 'hangry' (this could go alongside either of the above, too). Regardless of the cause, there are things you can do to help manage the meltdowns and make the transition from school to home a little smoother.

Have a healthy snack ready and waiting for the journey home - bananas are ideal but anything that is going to give them a boost of energy and keep them going until their evening meal will be good. Avoid sugary treats at this time - they provide a temporary energy fix but often come with a bigger crash later, which could actually cause its own meltdown!



Don't forget the water! Even if your child has a water bottle at school, you can't guarantee they will even touch it during the day. Sometimes, a fresh bottle of water simply handed to them quietly will make your child take a big, healthy drink, without them even really realising they've accepted it!

Try not to bombard your child with questions. Instead, greet them with a smile and a hug and let them steer the conversation. If they want to tell you something, they will. If they would rather mooch along quietly, likewise.

You could try modelling how to talk about your day. For example, tell them about your day, where you've been, something that's been good, something that's maybe not been so good. This can help your child build a framework for how to talk about their day when they are ready to.

Be present. This can be hard, especially if you are still on work calls or emails during pick-ups or are working in the evening, but having even a small window of time where you can focus on your child really matters to them.

Does your child struggle with separation from you? A little note in their pocket, or [Lunchbox Encouragement Card](#), could give them a bit more security throughout the day.

Some children really thrive on structure and need this to continue once they get home from school. You could try having a semi-set routine that you do every day when you get in - whether that's flopping for half an hour's downtime, or going straight to get changed out of their uniform - it can really help children to have a little plan in their minds for what is going to happen next.

Social Media Awareness.

Over the past year there has been a rise in the number of primary aged children with mobile phones. This has led to children accessing many apps which are not designed for their age range. New Apps pop up every day and it can be hard to keep on top of what the latest trend is. Due to this we wanted to make you aware of some of the latest apps out there that are likely to put children at risk.

This week we will look at:



What is Snapchat?

Snapchat is a popular social media messaging app that allows you to send and receive pictures and videos (called a Snap) to users. Snap Inc is the developer of the app and also creates other products such as Snapchat Spectacles.

It is available for both Android and iOS users and is free to download.

How does Snapchat work?

It was initially a private photo-sharing app. However, Snapchat features now include short videos, games, video chat, messaging, a place to store photos and more. Each Snap shared with your followers is temporary and is available for 24 hours unless you delete it or set a different limit. You can also add different filters, lenses, emojis and text to your Snap. Additionally, you can create a group chat to talk with friends or message individual friends.

As well as the above, Snapchat has a ‘Discovery’ and ‘Spotlight’ area.

- The Discovery feature – works as a newsfeed featuring content from news publishers and well-known people. Some use this feature to meet new people.
- The Spotlight feature – working like TikTok, Spotlight is a dedicated tab in Snapchat for promoting short viral videos. The Spotlight feature will use an algorithm to recommend the ‘most engaging’ posts to watch based on what a user is interested in.

To register, users must download the social media app to their device. Then they must enter their date of birth and create a username and password. Users are then asked to enter their mobile phone number. This is an optional step to help if you get locked out of your account. However, you can use email instead if you prefer.

What is Snapchat’s minimum age?

Like many other social networks, the minimum age to use Snapchat is 13 years old.

Does Snapchat have any privacy or safety features?

Snapchat introduced a Safety Advisory Board who 'educate, challenge, raise issues, and advise Snapchatters on how to keep the Snapchat community safe'.

Apart from the usual reporting, blocking, and disabling location features, Snapchat also has introduced the following:

- **Here For You** – a mental health feature that provides proactive in-app support to Snapchatters who may be experiencing mental health or emotional crisis, or who may be curious to learn more about these issues and how they can help friends dealing with them.
- **Safety Snapshot** – a digital literacy program by Snapchat aimed at educating Snapchatters about data, privacy, security, and online safety issues
- **Updated privacy for under 18s** – There are no browsable public profiles for Snapchatters under 18
- **Default chat functions** – By default, you cannot Chat or contact someone directly unless you have both added each other as friends.

Snapchat Games

Snapchat's gaming feature 'Snap Games' has various competitive and non-competitive games to play with friends. It also has a voice and chats feature where you can either text or through live audio. Users can also receive in-game rewards, like coins or items by watching an ad, however, Snapchat has stated 'video rewards may not be available for all Snapchatters' – but not specify what criteria you would have to meet. Snap Games can be accessed from the Snapchat app.

What is Snapchat Family Centre?

Snapchat Family Centre is an in-app feature to help parents engage with their teens' digital world. The feature helps lead the way for important online safety conversations. According to Snap, this will "reflect the way that parents engage with their teens in the real world." Just like offline, parents can know who their teens' online friends are. Family Centre on Snapchat allows a direct link between parent and teen.

What Snapchat Family Centre allows parents to do

- See which Snapchat friends their teens have sent messages, photos or videos to in the last seven days. It does not reveal the actual contents of their conversations (Snaps or messages);
- See a complete list of their teens' existing friends;
- Easily view new friends their teens have added, making it easy to start conversations about who their new contacts are;

- Easily and confidentially report any accounts Snapchat's 24/7 Trust and Safety teams to investigate;
- Access key information about how to use Family Centre tools as well as resources for important conversation starters and tips for using Snapchat safely.

Teens who have opted-in to Family Centre can also see what their parents see, with a mirrored view of features. Teens can also notify parents when they report an account or a piece of content on the platform.
